grant to Mary E. Curley, wife of James M. Curley, of said Bos-
ton with quitclaim covenants, a certain parcel of land
with the building thereon, situated on Spring Street in
Hull, in the County of Plymouth and said Commonwealth,
being lot numbered four (4) on a plan of lots belonging to
John Lucie Estate. Hull, Mass., July 1902, by Walter B.
Foster, C.E. Hingham, Mass. recorded with Plymouth County
Records, and bounded and described as follows: - Southerly on
Spring Street, eighty (80) feet; Westerly on land now of
formerly of Edith G. Galiano, one hundred and eight and
 $\frac{1}{100}$ (108.56) feet; Northerly on a private way shown on said
